Term Schedule:

Term 1: 21st September 2020 - 7th December 2020

The Typical Timetable

Sunday - serving at one service and attending the other services.

Monday - arriving at 09:00 for staff meeting, lectures, ministry till 16:00.

Tuesday - arriving at 09:00 for tutorials, lectures, ministry till 16:00.

Academy Graduation Date:

Sunday 11th July 2021

Course Cost:

£1000 per individual

For married couples, your spouse can join the course as well for £550.

Payment Structure:

1. £100 payable with application. Make cheques payable to Valley Church, or contact us for bank details to pay with a wire transfer. This amount is fully refundable in the case of a rejected application.
2. The balance of £900 (£450 for spouses) can then be paid either in full upon acceptance or spread over three terms, with three payments of £300 (£150 for spouses) being due (payable by the start date of each term: 16th September, 6th January, 20th April).

How To Apply:

Fill in the online application form found at valleychurch.eu/academy.

Deadline for applications for domestic students is the **31st August 2020** and for overseas students, **19th July 2020** to allow for visa applications. However, the sooner your application is submitted, the sooner an interview can be arranged, and the more likely you will be to secure a place.

Early applications close on the **30th April**, normal applications close on **30th June**, and final deadline is **31st August (19th July for foreign students)**. Interviews will happen within approx. 2 weeks of each closing date (subject to availability). There are limited spaces, so the sooner you apply, the more likely your application is to be accepted. Video interviews will be conducted for overseas students, and may be offered for domestic students who have far to travel.

Course Structure

The Academy consists of six major areas:

- Classroom Material
- Practical Assignments
- Tutorials
- Leadership Intensives
- Assessments and Exams
- Regular Church Involvement

Classroom Material*

There are eight classroom modules:

- Biblical Survey
- Campus & Extension Service Planting
- Christian Worldview
- Church Leadership
- Communication
- Evangelism
- Ministry Development
- Personal Leadership

*Classroom Module details are attached below. These are subject to change by the leadership dependent on student needs

Practical Assignments

In order to prepare you for real-life ministry situations, the practical assignments undertaken will give you grassroots experience in the modules studied in the classroom. This will involve actual preparation for launching new ministries, and Campus and Extension Service planting.

Tutorials

Weekly tutorials exist to cultivate community and support throughout the year for all Year In students. Time will be set aside to discuss Year In-specific issues, as well as your personal spiritual and leadership development.

Leadership Intensives

Several times throughout the year, we will take a break from the regular classroom modules to focus on various leadership topics for a full day. These will be delivered by church leaders from Valley Church, as well as our friends in church leadership across the UK and abroad.

Assessments and Exams

There will be various assessments and exams which will ensure you have understood, grasped and become competent in the classroom and practical content. These will take the form of practical

appraisals in activities such as event planning and management, individual and group presentations, as well as the assessment of coursework and formal exams.

Regular Church Involvement

All of the skills you will be learning and developing in the Year In programme will be immediately applicable in your weekend ministry involvement. If you attend another church, and wish to do the Year In whilst serving there, please get in touch to discuss options via the *contact us* page on the website.

Working During the Academy Programme

Valley's Year In runs from September to July. You are encouraged to seek or continue part-time work around the academic course, but we recommend that working hours do not exceed 20 hours each week, so that you can keep up with the demands of the course. The course will include both day-time and evening sessions as well as practical church involvement.

Accreditation

There is no official accreditation available, however at the end of your time at the Year In you will receive a certificate and a reference from Valley Church upon request. This will only be available should you have fulfilled the requirements of the academy programme.

Sickness

If you are sick during the programme you must inform the Dean of Students before 8:30am on the day of your absence. You must call in the afternoon the same day to inform the office whether you will be in the next day. If you are sick more than 2 weeks we will need a doctor's note from you to verify your inability to participate in the programme.

Transport

You are expected to make the necessary travel arrangements during the Year In programme. A car would be very useful, however the public transport system would be a good alternative.

Other requirements

A laptop to work on will be essential for assignments, reading and general participation in the programme.

Information for Overseas Students

Interview

Once you have submitted your application we will arrange an interview with you via telephone or preferably Google Hangouts. Our office will be in contact to make necessary arrangements for this.

Visa

You will need to apply for a Tier 5 (Temporary Worker – Religious worker) visa. Please check if you are eligible and requirements by following the link

You can apply for your visa up to 3 months before your date of travel to the UK. You should get a decision on your visa within 3 weeks.

Accommodation & Transport

There are two options for accommodation, please discuss your preference at interview.

1. Renting

You could share-rent a house whilst you are staying in the UK which would cost between £300 and £500 per month, all bills included. You will need to consider transport costs considering the location of the property.

2. Lodging

You could possibly find a family within church with whom you could lodge during your stay.

Working during Year In Programme

You must ensure that during your time in the UK you comply with the terms and conditions laid out in your Visa which means that you cannot accept any paid work or public funds during your stay.

Attendance

You must ensure that you attend the programme as regulated by your visa. Failure to comply may result in having to leave the programme and the UK.

Sponsorship

In accordance with your visa requirements you will need to have proof of funds as laid out in the terms and conditions. We would also recommend that during your stay you will have a sponsor to have you help with general living costs. We will discuss this with you further at interview.

Biblical Survey

Purpose

This unit introduces the Old and New Testaments, exploring the structure, literature, content and themes of the Bible, providing foundational skills for interpretation and understanding its message.

Course Objectives

- To understand the importance of the Bible.
- To develop familiarity with the literary shape, historical-cultural backgrounds and canonical placement of the individual books of the Bible.
- To develop an understanding of the overall structure, events and themes of the Bible.
- To explore the relevance of the whole Bible for living today.
- To understand the value of the Bible as the Word of God.
- Basic exegetical and hermeneutical skills.
- To develop an appreciation for the diverse yet unified nature of the whole Bible.
- To explore informed use of the Bible within personal and ministry contexts.

Campus & Extension Service Planting

Purpose

This unit introduces students to the practical and theoretical requirements needed to develop and establish new Campuses and Extension Services.

Course Objectives

- To understand the Campus and Extension Service model of Valley Church.
- To introduce the skills and knowledge necessary for planting Campuses and Extension Services.
- To understand the Great Commission and the requirement on all Christians to “make disciples”, and the role of church planting in this mission.
- To explore the biblical foundation of the local church.
- To examine current trends, methods, ideas and movements in church planting.
- To look into the principles, practices and processes involved in providing Campus and Extension Service leadership.

Christian Worldview

Purpose

This unit introduces the concept of the Christian Worldview and the Christian mind. The module will include both an introduction to the way that Christian belief impacts all Christian thinking as well as an analysis of major challenges to the Christian worldview such as atheism, naturalism, postmodernism and consumerism.

Course Objectives

- To understand the role of a Christian Worldview in a believer's life.
- To understand the intellectual coherence and force of a Christian Worldview.
- To understand how a truly Christian mind affects one's total life experience.
- To value the power of thinking Christianly in all things.
- To model a Christian mind integrated with action in the church and society.
- To gain a theological understanding of one's Christian Worldview and its application within a Christian setting.
- A basic understanding of apologetics.

Church Leadership

Purpose

This module seeks to provide the student with an understanding of the skills necessary for exercising leadership and influence in a church context, including vision, example, mentoring and coaching, motivating and teamwork. It involves learning how to work towards an agreed vision using teamwork.

Course Objectives

- To understand the church leadership structure, style and philosophy of Valley Church.
- To understand the common principles of leadership and management.
- To examine these in a local church context.
- To identify common problems associated with leadership, management in a local church setting, and skills to cope.
- To gain an appreciation of one's own leadership makeup, and those of others.
- To gain a theological understanding of leadership and its application within a church setting.
